She also job shadowed Carolynn Holly at the KTVB station where she learned all the ins and outs of a news broadcasting station. As for her last and main career she chose nursing. She job shadowed at Malheur memorial health clinic, St. Alphonsus in Ontario and St. Alphonsus in Boise.

Although Chelsey loved every single job shadow she admitted that there were two shadows in specific that were her favorite. One of these was the job shadow with St. Alphonsus in Boise in the NICU where she got a tingling sensation of happiness for being there and the second

one was at St. Alphonsus in Ontario when she was able to experience her first C-section and knew that this was the place she wanted to be because the beautiful cry of a new born child.

Along with job shadows a physical project is also required in order to pass senior project and Chelsey knew exactly what she wanted to do. She set up a health fair with the help of a donation of \$500 from the North Eastern Area Health Department from the Oregon health department who also brought vaccines. The health fair was very successful and with the help of the Lions Club who helped with breakfast and various volunteers everything ran smoothly. She contacted many people who willingly accepted to be part of her health fair. These people included the Blood Bus, two mammogram buses, Nurses from TVCC, and some nurses from St. Alphonsus in Ontario who helped to test for diabetes.

Chelsey was very happy with the turn out of the event and found great pleasure in knowing that she had helped someone. She believes that no matter where you are there should always be an opportunity where you can have some soft of health care in order to take care of yourself. She also had regards to her senior project mentor Kelsey Zimmerman and her physical project advisor Stephanie Allison. She was very thankful for them and exclaimed that she couldn't have done it without them.

Through these experiences she has learned that the career she believed she should go into was right on the mark and for future her plans are becoming a NICU nurse. Oregon Battle of the Books

Adrian expects to field 3 teams for Oregon Battle of the Books (OBOB) this year. Interested high school students, coached by Mr. Kelly Tolman, are reading the 12 books on this year's high school list. Up to 20 elementary students are foregoing one noon recess a week to meet with their coach, Mrs. Malin Abril. Middle school students are reading books from their OBOB list and will start more formal practices in the next week or two.

According to the OBOB website (www.oboblsta.pbworks.com), "The Oregon Battle of the Books, OBOB, is a statewide voluntary reading motivation and comprehension program sponsored by the Oregon Association of School Libraries in conjunction with a Library Services and Technology Act grant. Students in 3rd-12th grade, regardless of ability, are exposed to quality literature representing a variety of literary styles and viewpoints. The mission is to encourage and recognize students who enjoy reading, to broaden reading interests, to increase reading comprehension, promote academic excellence, and to promote cooperative learning and teamwork among students."

Scholastic Book Fair

Give books from the book fair being held in January as Christmas gifts? Yes! Book fair gift certificates are available in any amount. Usually a few books at a book fair are available for \$1; more books are in the \$5 range; hardback picture books could cost \$15-\$20. Pencils and erasers and bookmarks are also available.

Book fair gift certificates have many advantages:

- Save money: spend what you usually would for Christmas gifts and eliminate the need to spend more at the book fair
- Simplify book fair shopping: students who have gift certificates know how much money they have to spend so questions and decisions at the book fair are minimized
- Encourage responsibility: students who have a certain amount to spend learn to make choices as to which items they really want
- Increase anticipation: students who have gift certificates have a month to look forward to the gift of new books in addition to whatever gifts they got in December

Give a gift that is appreciated: Adrian students in kindergarten through 8th grade usually find many things at the book fair that they would like to purchase; book fair gift certificates could be given as gifts to children, grandchildren, neighbors, and friends

- Stop by the library any time before Christmas to pay for and pick up the certificates

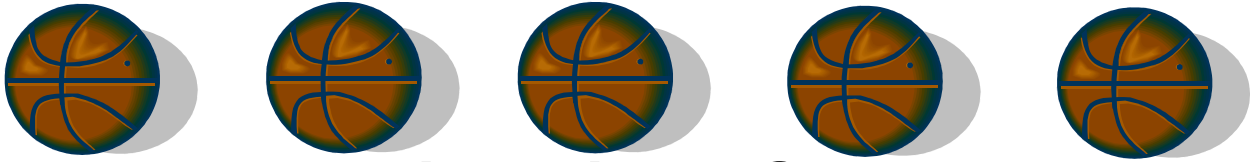

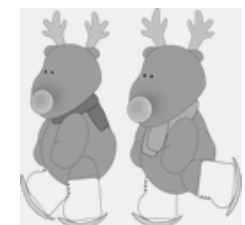



Condensed Board Meeting Minutes
October 11, 2012

Members present were: Neil Allison, Jake Speelmon, Casey Walker, and Paul Shenk. Ryan Martin was absent.

Call to Order The meeting was called to order by Board Chairman, Neil Allison, at 8:00 p.m. The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adopt Agenda The agenda was amended to add action item: g) Overnight Trip Request. Motion was made and was seconded to adopt the agenda as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

Student and Personnel Communications

Student Reports/Requests Danny Livas reported that the FFA did well at the dairy judging with the advanced team placing 2nd and the beginning team placing 4th. The Health Fair was a success and the Gleaners gave away potatoes to the volunteers who were working at the health fair. The football and volleyball teams defeated Crane. The advanced biology field trip went well and they will report at the next meeting. Homecoming spirit week is next week.

Paul Shenk and Danny Livas left the meeting following the Student Body Report to return to football practice.

Elementary Principal Report Mr. Ellsworth reported that the middle school football team is 2 and 2 and the middle school volleyball team placed second in the WIC League. Parent-Teacher Conferences are coming up on October 24th and 25th. The PTO Halloween Carnival is October 27th from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. The elementary class Halloween parties are October 31st at 2:30 p.m. the fourth through eighth grade students will be attending the Young People's Symphony on October 25th.

High School Principal Report Mr. Purnell reported that he had attended the OSBA Dinner Meeting. The meeting style was more enjoyable and informative than past meetings have been. The main topics included the Achievement Compacts and PERS. The Northwest Accreditation has changed to AdvancED, so there is a new accreditation process and he has been working on the forms. The Oregon –Idaho College Fair is coming up and there will be about seventy colleges, universities and schools providing information to students. Sophomores and juniors will be taking the PSAT test. Parent-Teacher Conferences are coming up on the 24th and 25th. There will be two teachers gone and they will be making arrangements to be available to meet with parents at another time. Stephanie Allison, Krissy Walker, and he attended a SchoolMaster training in La Grande today and yesterday.

Superintendent Report Mr. Mills is absent but Mr. Purnell reported that the superintendent will be working with the Adrian Education Association, which the licensed teacher bargaining unit, to implement the newly established -school reforms.

Financial Report Darla Witty provided a consolidated balance sheet for all funds and a summary of receipts and expenditures as of September 30, 2012 organized by both function and object. She also reported that we would be getting a reduction in the Demo contract as Mr. Mills had agreed that we would not have the asbestos tiles removed in the small portion of the old building that was retained. Mr. Purnell explained that the portion was not completed because the contractor had interpreted it to be part of the additional quote that the board decided not to do.

Public Comment There were none.

Consent Agenda Motion was made and was seconded to approve the September 13, 2012 minutes as presented and to approve the payment of the bills as listed in the amount of \$254,296.67. Motion carried unanimously.

Action Items

Revised Policy EFAA-AR Reimbursable School Meals and Milk Program Policy EFAA-AR is being revised to reflect the changes to the School Nutrition Program made by the Healthy, Hunger-free Kids Act of 2010. The primary changes to the policy pertain to meal planning and what constitutes a reimbursable meal. Motion was made and was seconded to adopt Policy EFAA-AR Reimbursable School Meals and Milk Programs as revised. Motion carried unanimously.

Set Non-reimbursable meal prices Darla Witty explained that the district receives \$2.88 for each reimbursable lunch; for free lunch the full amount is paid by the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), for reduced meals the student pays \$.40 and the NSLP pays the balance, and for paid reimbursable meals the NSLP pays \$.29 for each meal while the student pays the rate established by the district. We charge \$2.30 for K-5 lunches and \$2.55 for 6-12 grade lunches. The new meal pattern requires students to take a minimum of three of the five items offered, and one of the choices must be ½ cup fruit or vegetable. Kindergarten thru 5th grade students receive all of their meal elements on the serving line and so it would be rare that a student would refuse to take a reimbursable meal; however, if they did then the meal could not be claimed for reimbursement. The middle school and high school students may leave the service line without a fruit or vegetable because it is offered on the salad bar. If the student chooses to avoid the salad bar and is observed proceeding to the seating area without taking the required fruit or vegetable then the meal may not be claimed for reimbursement. Students who choose to take a non-reimbursable meal would need to pay the non-reimbursable price. The students have been informed of the new meal requirements and we do not foresee a problem, however the non-reimbursable rate would need to be in place in the event the situation arose. The recommended rate for non-reimbursable lunch is \$2.85 for grades 6-12 and \$2.30 for pre-school and elementary lunch. Motion was made by Casey Walker and was seconded by Jake Speelmon to set the non-reimbursable lunch rates as proposed. Motion carried unanimously.

Winter Sport Coach Extra-duty Contracts It was recommended that extra-duty contracts be offered as follows: Head Girls Basketball Coach, Gene Mills, Assistant Girls Basketball Coach, Kevin Purnell, Head Boys Basketball Coach, Brent Ishida, Assistant Boys Basketball Coach, Blake Ishida, Wrestling Coach, Eddie Kinkade, Middle School Girls Basketball Coach, Nolan Shira, and Middle School Boys Basketball Coach, Nolan Shira. Motion was made and was seconded to offer extra-duty contracts as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

Offer Work Agreements for Classified Staff It was recommended the board offer a work agreement to Shana Franklin for the Cook position. Motion was made and was seconded to offer a work agreement to Shana Franklin as recommended. Motion carried unanimously. It was also recommended that Jennifer Spiers be offered a work agreement for Instructional Assistant for 7 ½ hours per day on the days the students are in session. Motion was made by Jake Speelmon and was seconded by Casey Walker to offer a work agreement to Jennifer Spiers as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

Renew Girls Golf Co-op with Nyssa It is time to renew the girls golf coop with Nyssa High School. This is for a two year period. We still have a student enrolled who has been participating in the golf program. Motion was made and was seconded to coop with Nyssa for Girls golf for 2012-13 and 2013-14. Motion carried unanimously.

Approve Achievement Compact Advisory Board It was recommended that the following be appointed as the Achievement Compact Advisory Board: Kevin Purnell, Bill Ellsworth, Aimee Esplin, Jennifer White, and Joan Gordon. Motion was made and was seconded to appoint the Achievement Compact Advisory Board as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

Overnight Trip Request Mr. Ellsworth requested an overnight trip for Mrs. Gordon to take a group of middle school girls to the Girls in Science in La Grande. She has taken girls for a number of years and has left early in the morning which makes for a very long day. Motion was made and was seconded to approve an overnight trip for a group of middle school girls to attend Girls In Science. Motion carried unanimously.

Executive Session Executive session as provided by ORS 192.660 to discuss a student matter was entered at 8:50 p.m. Regular session reconvened at 9:05 p.m.

Adjournment Motion was made and was seconded to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried unanimously. The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:05 p.m.
