Oregon residents in kindergarten through grade 5 are eligible to participate.





The Adrian School District will have two board positions, Zone #4 Big Bend and Zone #5 Ridgeview up for election on May 17, 2011. February 5, 2011 is the first day candidates may file and March 17, 2011 is the last day candidates may file. Candidacy must be filed with the Malheur County Clerk at the Courthouse in Vale, Oregon. Information and forms needed to file for candidacy are available at the Malheur County Clerk's office or from the Adrian School District office.

RECOVERY ACT FUNDS SCHOOL LIGHTING PROJECT

The Oregon Department of Energy announced that Adrian School District will receive \$20,100 in federal funds for an energy-efficient lighting project. The project is funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act awarded through the *State Energy Program (SEP)*. These funds are designated for energy efficiency and renewable energy projects in public buildings.

The U.S. Department of Energy administers the funds, approves the projects and reviews the state's progress. Adrian School District will use the funds for lighting retrofits at the Adrian High School Buildings.

"We are pleased to make this award to the Adrian School District," said Paul Egbert, acting manager of the Oregon Department of Energy ARRA team. "Not only will students and staff enjoy a learning environment with better lighting, but the funds will put local contractors to work."

The Oregon Department of Energy received more than 1,100 letters of interest, representing a request of over \$2 billion in Recovery Act funding.

Condensed Board Meeting Minutes January 11, 2011

Members present were: Paul Shenk, Neil Allison, Ryan Martin, Casey Walker (came at 7:30), and Jake Speelmon (came at 7:40 pm).

<u>Call to Order</u> The meeting was called to order by Board Chairman, Neil Allison, at 7:05 p.m. The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adopt Agenda The agenda was amended by adding action item, d) PERS Request. Motion was made and was seconded to adopt the agenda as amended. Motion carried unanimously (Casey Walker and Jake Speelmon absent).

Student Reports/Requests Madison Shira reported that the FFA District contest is coming up on February 2. Raquel DeHoog and Tane't Campbell will be participating in the Creed Contest and we will also have a Beginning Parliamentary Procedure team. The Winter Music program was held on Dec. 20th, it went well and there were two employees who sang with the high school choir to help out. The basketball teams were at Imbler and Cove last weekend. The wrestling team has had a couple of their matches cancelled. January 14th is the Science Lab Open House. Next week is Tip-Off with the community pep assembly scheduled for Friday, January 21st.

<u>Elementary Principal Report</u> Mr. Ellsworth reported that there are middle school boys and girls basketball games here today with Jordan Valley. The Winter Music programs, held before Winter Break went well. The middle school science fair that was organized by Ester Gordon as her physical project went well. We are taking advantage of the teeth sealant program for 1st through 5th grade students. The Battle of the Books competition is starting.

High School Principal Report Mr. Purnell reported that the wrestling team did not go to their meet last weekend due to injury and illness and the meet scheduled today was cancelled by Marsing. The Science Lab Open House is open to adults and middle school students to come in and do a lab. There will be three games at Jordan Valley this Friday; varsity boys, and two JV boys' games, one of which will be with boys and girls combined as Jordan Valley only have 4 girls and are fielding a co-ed team so the girls have an opportunity to participate. Our girls will play in that game, but OSAA rules dictate it to be a boy's contest because it is co-ed. Mr. Purnell reported that he will be teaching personal finance this semester. He reported that he had given the staff a book "The Mentor", the staff will be going through the book and having weekly discussions.

Superintendent Report Mr. Mills reported that the County Superintendent's meeting that was scheduled to be held in Adrian on Jan. 19th has been moved to the ESD (Education Service District) where the Superintendents and Business Managers will review the ESD's Local Service Plan. The Local Service Plan will be on the agenda in February. The County Superintendent's meeting will be held in Adrian on April 19th. The

basketball teams have been having a lot of away games. It is hard to get people to come here. We have tried to

get away games back to back and stay overnight in the schools and have Mrs. Purnell prepare meals to save on cost.

<u>Financial Report</u> Darla Witty presented a summary of receipts and expenditures and a balance sheet as of December 31, 2010, and a general fund financial summary showing how expenditure levels for the remainder of the year will affect cash carryover. A Student Body account summary as if December 31, 2010 was also presented.

Public Comment There were none.

<u>Consent Agenda</u> Motion was made and was seconded to adopt the December 9, 2010 minutes as presented and to approve payment of the bills as listed in the amount of \$163,103.10. Motion carried unanimously (Casey Walker and Jake Speelmon absent).

Action Items

<u>Superintendent Evaluation Process and Timeline</u> It was the consensus of the board that they did not feel a formal evaluation of the superintendent was necessary as every year the results and the comments have been about the same. They will discuss the superintendent's performance with him in executive session.

<u>Budget Calendar for 2011-2012 Budget</u> Darla Witty presented a proposed calendar for the preparation of the 2011-2012 Budget. The calendar proposes a single budget committee meeting at which the budget will be presented and public comment taken. Motion was made and was seconded to adopt the Budget Calendar as presented. Motion carried unanimously (Jake Speelmon was absent).

PERS Request Mr. Mills requested the \$702.67 which was budgeted for PERS on the Head Girls Basketball stipend be donated to the girl's basketball fund as in past years because he is retired from PERS. Motion was made and was seconded to approve Mr. Mills' request. Motion carried unanimously (Jake Speelmon was absent).

ESD Local Service Plan Mr. Mills passed out copies of the ESD Local Service Plan. This will be on the agenda in February.

<u>Board Member Election Calendar</u> The district will have two board positions, Zone #4 Big Bend and Zone #5 Ridgeview, up for election on May 17, 2011. An election timeline was distributed to the board. February 5, 2011 is the first day candidates may file and March 17, 2011 is the last day they may file.


Continuous Improvement Plan Mr. Ellsworth and Mr. Purnell presented the district's Continuous Improvement Plan which includes specific goals for school improvement and detailed plans on how the district will meet these goals. The English Language Learner program plan, the technology plan, and the Career and Technical Education program plan are all part of the Continuous Improvement Plan. Penny Grotting from the ESD, assisted in the drafting of the plan, which will be submitted to the state and is critical to receiving federal funding. District improvement goals have been established for Math and Writing. The math goal is that 75% of high school juniors will pass the state math assessment and the remaining 25% will pass by 2011-2012 when they are seniors. The writing goal is that number of students passing the state writing assessment will improve from 58.4% to 80% by 2012.
